THE CLOSING CEREMONY



The Closing Ceremony started with a showcase of the mesmerizing campus and sparkling students of DC in the form of a video. Following this was the introduction of the Chief Guest, Mr. John Shulman, a lawyer, human rights activist, and artist, who is a graduate of Harvard College and Harvard Law School. Mr Shulman was vocal in his appreciation for the delegates and the organising committee as he expressed how it made him think on a broader scale, something he had not done in his school days. From the vast experience and knowledge he possessed, he gave the students five things to ponder over and apply. These included considering the common interest of people, listening to and understanding what people said, questioning the authorities, forming healthy and reciprocal relations, and understanding the importance of love and compassion. He explained how these thoughts would be essential in the battles that were to be fought by this generation.

This thought- provoking speech was followed by an exquisite performance by the dance troupe of DC which emphasized on how Mother Earth was dying and how its revival was in the hands of this generation. After the dance performance, principal Neeraj Kumar Bedhotiya gave a speech in which he acknowledged what Mr Shulman said and congratulated all the students on a successful MUN.

Then came the award distribution, in which the EB members gave their reports on their committees and presented the awards to the delegates. A closing video was then presented, showing the highlights of the MUN. The ceremony concluded with the Secretary General declaring the MUN closed and the logistics co-ordinator proposing a vote of thanks.

DC MUN COMES TO AN END

On the final day of the conference, the delegates were ready to compile all their knowledge and information they had gained from the past two days and form the Draft Resolution. For some committees, the road was long and full of turmoil. Take International Peace and Security for example. Delegates of India, DRC, and Australia blamed the P₅ nations for bribing the others to join their bloc. However, USA, UK, and their allies did not agree with them. As a result, delegates went into an unmoderated caucus to resolve these issues before they finally sat to build the DR. On the other hand, delegates from the committee of Art and Culture seemed to have a quick panel discussion and a moderated caucus, after which they sat till the third session to work on the DR, which was unanimously passed.



Nevertheless, all committees seemed to pass their DRs successfully, bringing the formal proceeding to an end. Following this was an informal motion of entertainment. Committees had different approaches to this, some seemed to wear sunglasses and bob their heads to music, while others seemed to indulge in an anonymous feedback session. In the end, delegates bade each other goodbye and wished them well for the award ceremony.

INTERVIEW WITH SHREYASI CHAUDHARY

Chairperson of Socal Equitability



Q1. Was the virtual MUN better or worse than an offline MUN?

In some ways a virtual MUN had its downsides. We can't meet delegates, and often they keep their videos off, so it's hard to understand people. However, I do think it was handled well; we had feedback sessions that led delegates to be more open and discord was a very good channel that wouldn't have been used if the MUN were offline. We were able to put the EB into break out rooms, where they could finish their work without interruption, ratify the DR, and rant about the committee, all of this away from the eyes of the delegates.

Q2. WHAT IS THE MOST THOUGHT PROVOKING POINT OF ARGUMENT A DELEGATE HAS BROUGHT UP?

I think what was interesting was that countries like Pakistan that didn't support certain concepts like same sex marriage, LGBTQ+ rights, spoke about it and said that at the moment they didn't accept it, but with the new world order they were hoping to improve on this.

Q3. If you had to choose a committee other than your own, which one would you choose to be the chair of and why?

I would choose International Peace and Security probably because there would be more room for debate, and it would be more controversial.

Q4. What is your biggest takeway from this MUN?

Well, our working paper was initially 22 pages and it was a task just to bring it down to 18 pages. That was when I realised that every delegate had so much of information, opinions, and ideas for a new world order. I feel there are a lot of improvements we can make by evaluating the shortcomings of the UN.

Q5. Finally, what was your favourite part of this MUN?

The past two days we had one on one feedback sessions and MOEs where we went into breakout rooms. It gave us the opportunity to get to know the delegates better.
